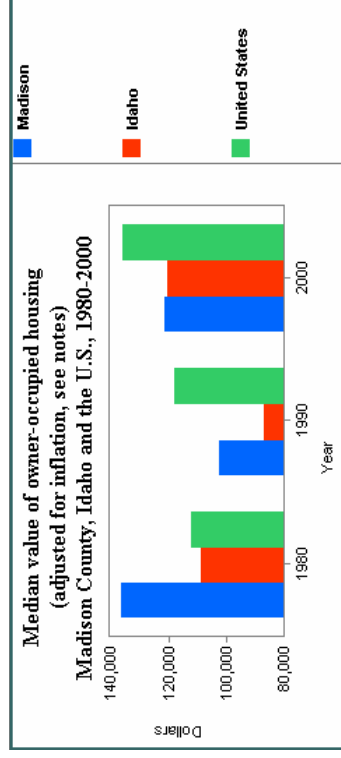


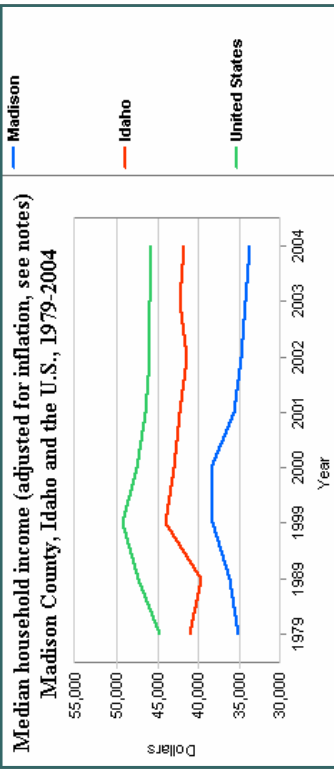
Housing

- ◆ The median value of owner-occupied housing (adjusted for inflation) was \$121,137 in 2000, compared to \$120,570 in Idaho and \$135,655 in the US.
- ◆ The median value decreased by 11.1% from 1980 to 2000, compared to a 10.8% increase in Idaho and a 21.0% increase in the US.
- ◆ The median value ranked 9th – from highest to lowest – in 2000 out of Idaho's 44 counties.
- ◆ The number of housing units increased by 29.6% from 2000 to 2004, compared to an increase of 9.7% in Idaho.



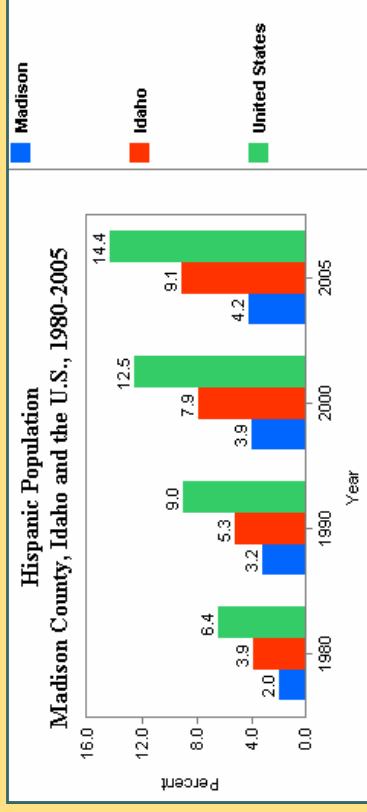
Income

- ◆ The county's per capita income in 2003 (adjusted for inflation) was \$16,486, below both the state average of \$27,788 and the national average of \$34,171.
- ◆ Between 1994 and 2004 per capita income increased by 17.9% in Madison, 12.7% in Idaho, and 16.9% in the US.
- ◆ The median household income (adjusted for inflation) was \$33,673 in 2004 compared to \$41,883 in Idaho and \$45,837 in the US.



Hispanic Population

- ◆ The proportion of Hispanic residents grew from 2.0% in 1980, to 3.2% in 1990, and to 4.2% in 2005.



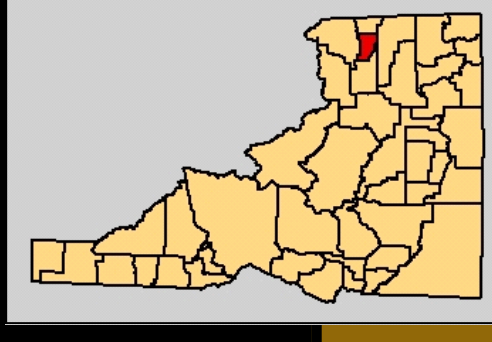
Age Structure

- ◆ 26.5% of Madison County's population was under 18 in 2005, in contrast to 26.2% in Idaho and 24.8% in the US.
- ◆ In 2005, 67.4% of the population was 18 to 64 years old, compared to 62.3% in Idaho and 62.8% in the US.
- ◆ Madison County's median age in 2005 was 22.2 compared to 34.5 in Idaho and 36.2 in the US.

Note: The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of inflation. Using the CPI to put dollar values in "real" terms makes it easier to see "inflation-free" change over time. 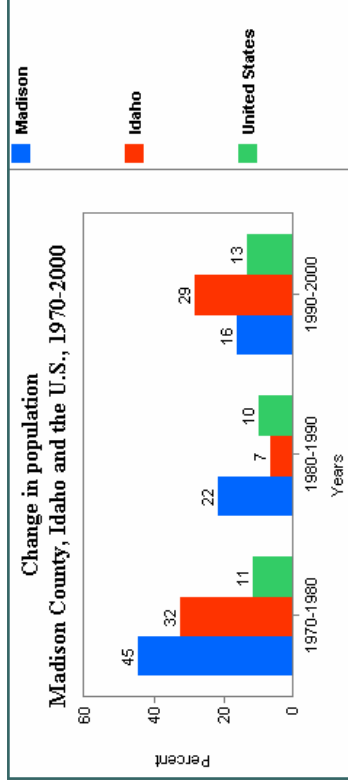
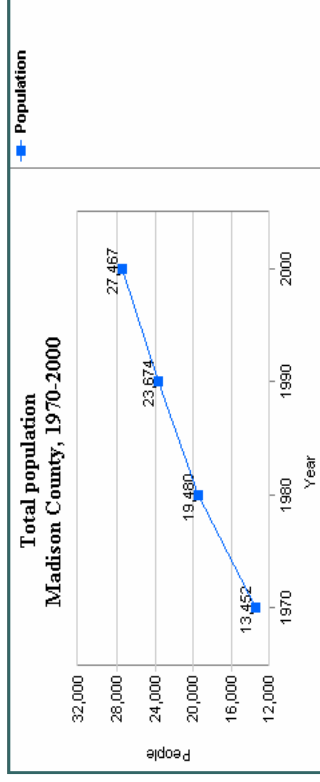


COUNTY HIGHLIGHTS

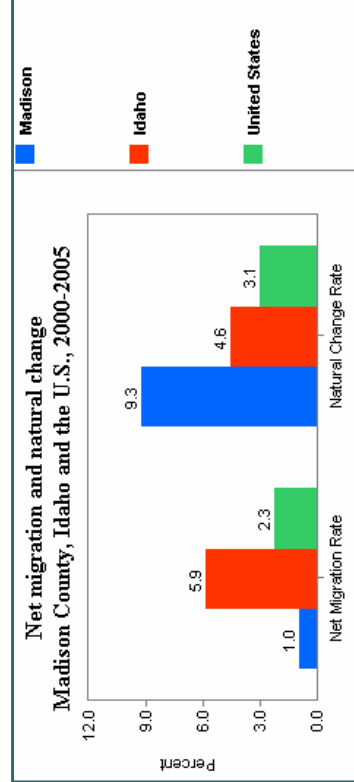
- ◆ Madison County's total population in 2005 was 30,975.
- ◆ The 2004 self-employment rate was 18.7% compared to 23.0% for Idaho and 18.4% for the US.
- ◆ In 2004, the median household income was \$33,673.
- ◆ Madison County's average annual unemployment rate was 2.4% in 2005.
- ◆ The crime rate was lower than both the state and national rate.

Population Change

- ◆ Madison Co. gained 3,508 residents between 2000 and 2005.
- ◆ Population grew by 12.8% between 2000 and 2005, compared to an increase of 10.4% in the state as a whole.



- ◆ Madison County was the 6th fastest growing county out of Idaho's 44 counties.
- ◆ Since 1970, Madison County has gained 3,508 residents.
- ◆ The migration rate was below the state average and the natural change rate was above the state average in 2005.

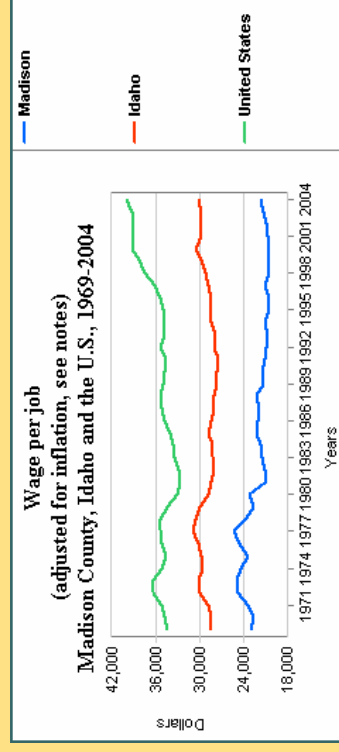


Employment

- ◆ The average annual unemployment rate in 2005 was 2.4%, compared to 3.8% for Idaho and 5.1% for the US. Madison County ranked 44th—from highest to lowest—out of Idaho's 44 counties.
- ◆ The largest number of jobs in 2004 were provided by retail trade, government, and administrative & waste services.
- ◆ The number of jobs was 16,793 in 2004, compared to 4,792 in 1969—a 250% increase.

- ◆ In 2004 the self-employment rate was 18.7%, compared to 23.0% for Idaho and 18.4% for the US.
- ◆ The average wage per job in 2004 (adjusted for inflation) was \$21,856, up slightly from \$21,245 a decade earlier. The average was \$30,311 in Idaho and \$40,113 in the US.



Social Trends

Educational Attainment

- ◆ In 2000, 11.5% of the population 25 years and older had no high school diploma, compared to 15.3% in Idaho and 19.6% in the US.
- ◆ In 2000, 24.4% had a bachelor's degree or higher, compared to 21.7% in Idaho and 24.4% in the US.

Poverty

- ◆ Madison County's overall poverty rate was 15.6% in 2004, 30.5% in 1999 and 28.6% in 1989.
- ◆ Statewide, the overall poverty rate in 2004 was 11.5% and the US rate was 12.7%.
- ◆ Madison County's child poverty rate (for people under 18) was 13.0% in 2004, 11.7% in 1999, and 14.0% in 1989.
- ◆ The poverty rate for people 65 and over was 10.1 percent in 1999 and 8.6 percent in 1989.

Madison County Youth

- ◆ The teen birth rate in 2004 was 7 per 1,000, compared to 17 per 1,000 in Idaho and 23 per 1,000 in the US.
- ◆ Teens who were not working, looking for work, and not in school made up 1.3% of all youth age 16-19 in 2000, compared to 7.8% in Idaho and 8.9% in the US.

Crime and Law Enforcement

- ◆ The total number of crimes reported in 2002 was 130 per 10,000 population, compared to 317 in Idaho and 412 in the US.
- ◆ The number of sworn police officers per 1,000 population was 1.8, compared to 1.8 in Idaho and 2.3 in the US in 2004.
